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Dartmoor Calling: Charlotte Bill



Our next 2024 - 2025 Associate Artist is filmmaker and musician,
Charlotte Bill. Charlotte's films take us into the worlds of the
overlooked and underrepresented; focusing on working class history,
women, activists and outsider artists, she creates her work using
documentary, archive materials, landscape and music.

Charlotte is working with the Dartmoor Preservation Association, The Lost Giants, The Stars are for Everyone, various volunteers and Clapham Film Unit to create Dartmoor Calling. Collecting the stories of the people who saved Dartmoor from development, the people who are restoring nature on Dartmoor and the people working for land access rights on Dartmoor. Creating a documentary, booklet, two guided walks and a set of oral history recordings, this project will

be developed during her time as an associate artist at Exeter Phoenix.

During the current stage of the project, Charlotte is running two walks that celebrate Sylvia Sayer and the Dartmoor Preservation

Association's activism. Here's a bit more from Charlotte about the walks and the project:

"Sylvia Sayer (1908 - 2000) was an activist, fearless campaigner and loving grandmother. Known as the Shield of Dartmoor, she campaigned against development and spoliation of the moor. She fought the military, the government, the clay companies and the water board.

'Stand on a summit in Central Dartmoor, it is still wild and free, we owe that to Sylvia Sayer who devoted over half a century to defending Dartmoor' - Kate Ashbrook

Clapham Film Unit and the Dartmoor Preservation Association are running two free Sylvia Sayer Walks, 3rd and 24th August, which will take us to some of the places she saved and some of the battles she lost. The walks will be led by Gillian Healey from Dartmoor Walking Tours.

Kate Ashbrook, activist and general secretary of the Open Spaces Society, vicechair of the Campaign for National Parks and of the Dartmoor Preservation Association who was inspired by Sylvia Sayer and became a close friend, will be


there to tell stories on the way. Matthew Kelly, historian and author of 'The Women who Saved the English Countryside' (2022), will be providing context.

I met Kate Ashbrook when I was making a documentary about the Right to Roam. Kate told me about campaigning with Sylvia Sayer on Dartmoor in the 1970s. Later the same year I found myself on Dartmoor with 3000 other people protesting the wild camping ban. I met many activists and members of the Stars are for Everyone and Right to Roam. These experiences led to the development of Dartmoor Calling, supported by players of the National Lottery.

Dartmoor Calling will tell Sylvia's story and will collect the stories of today's activists and campaigners from The Stars are for Everyone and the Right to Roam. 75 years apart in time but united by their love for Dartmoor as a wild a special place, a National Park to be kept free for all of us to enjoy.

I am excited to be an Associate Artist with Exeter Phoenix. I will be able to develop this project, reach a wider community and find a supportive environment to share Dartmoor Calling."


Flicker:

A Creative Response to the Phoenix Archive Project




In August we premiered our two commissions as part of our ongoing **Phoenix Archive Project**. The evening included a debut screening of Xenia Glen and Antosh Wojcik's new film 'The Memory Boom', an archive-based exploration of preserving memories in the modern era, and a performance of new music from Holly Ebony - both pieces created in response to the rescued 16mm film from the project.

Last month our Pathways intern Ellie McLaughlin also responded creatively to the archive, and wrote the poem 'Flicker'.







Both Ashley Thorpe and Graham Hayter, our tutors for the Young and Animated clubs, have years of experience and a wealth of knowledge of animation techniques and the children's television industry. We asked them what they enjoy about providing these sessions, and what they learn about creativity from working with young people.

What's the most interesting idea a young person has had for an animation?

Ashley: Where do we start? Young & Animated has been a treasure trove of wild ideas since its conception. I'm still endlessly surprised. Whenever I think I've seen everything something extraordinary pops up. We've had everything from a beautiful parody of 1930's Fleischer shorts to a very funny - almost Pacman-esque - recreation of the finale of 'The Shining'. Funny, sweet, gory, you name it. Anything goes.

Graham: It's hard to pick between the multitude of films I've helped the kids create within the 14 years I've been doing this, as all the films are brilliant, weird, funny, creative and filled with great ideas in their own way, especially to the kids that create them. I always find it hard to quantify art, as there is no right or wrong, good or bad, only whether you personally like it or not, so it's hard to pick between films about portaling wizards, haphazard unicorns, giant vampire carrots, superhero snails, planet eating footballs, bone breaking

ballerinas, cyborg woodland animals, paparazzied paintings or colourful blobs - they're all wonderful, weird, funny, creative and full of the best ideas. The best thing is seeing your own ideas coming to life in front of your own eyes, and the feeling you get when you think "I made this", when you watch back your own creation.

Why is it important to teach creative processes like this from a young age?

Ashley: The imagination is a muscle that needs to be exercised or else it atrophies. Creativity is such an important part of growth. It's a



power and a social leveller. Doesn't matter where you come from. As young children we learn via play and that approach is one that can carry you through life. We're constantly worried about doing the wrong thing. But when you play that's not a threat, you're just throwing ideas into the wind. That's one of the reasons that Graham and I decided pretty early on that this is an animation club, not a course as such. It's a place where you can come and play, try things, see what works and what doesn't and by trying a little bit of everything find a way to realise the ideas inside your head. Animation is an amazing thing. It gives you the opportunity to defy logic, defy nature and realism and reinvent the world upon a whimsy but it also has the opportunity to teach you to structure and refine your ideas and become organised and controlled. And it can potentially become a fantastic way to collaborate with others.

Graham: The importance of exploring creative processes from a young age has multiple benefits, you learn to express yourself creativity rather than destructively, as well as boosting an individuals imagination (and a world without imaginative art would be very dull) and an education or upbringing without creative outlets can diminish an individuals imagination and creativity. Also, being creative can bring you joy and happiness in trying times, as in the world of animation silliness can rule over seriousness, and the shy among us can still be the class clowns and make our peers laugh. It's great helping kids bring their imaginations alive through the magic of animation.

Is there anything you've learned from the young people that you've incorporated into your own practices?

Ashley: Absolutely, yes! I'm endlessly inspired by the films that they make. The commercial environment can sometimes get a little dry. Teaching these classes constantly remind me why I fell in love with animation in the first place. Recently, we've encouraged a couple of the Young and Animated Plus members who are exceptional at drawing to create guite traditional hand drawn frame by frame animations. Hundreds of drawings. It's really back to basics in terms of animation practice but the process is so tactile, so analog that the end result has a wonderful very magical quality. Watching these two young animators draw these wonderful sequences made me yearn to do something hand drawn again, so when a contract came in to create a Peter Pan animation I absolutely made it an excuse to do something in a similar vein. I admit these things endlessly to my clients. I am immensely proud of what Graham and I do.

Dartmoor Preservation Association and Clapham Film Unit are working together to collect the stories of the people who saved Dartmoor from development, from the 1950s to the present day.

We are also **collecting the stories** of the people who worked for access to the land, and the stories of people who are involved in restoring nature on Dartmoor.
