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Torquay Cinema Heritage Project



The team at Exeter Phoenix have been busy this summer working on the Torquay Cinema Heritage Project, a collection of short films that look at the history and impact of cinema and film in Torquay and how the people, places and memories of cinema going continue to influence the town. They launched the project with a screening at Kents Cavern in October, and below is an insight into the project so far.

Why were you interested in taking on this project?

The project came about after we ran a similar project in Exeter a few years ago, collecting memories and oral histories of cinema going in the city. When the opportunity came up to do the same in Torquay we jumped at the chance. Torquay has such a deep connection with

cinema, and we wanted to capture some of the stories and history around that, and hopefully open up some conversations about the importance of oral history in preserving memories of everyday life.

Have there been any particularly interesting stories that have come up?

We've collected lots of great stories as part of the project - much more than we could fit in the final films! We've heard about some of the seven cinemas that existed, the films that were shot in Torquay



and the importance of cinema to the town. I think my favourite story might be when we were filming at Kent's Cavern for their Cave Cinema event and heard about how the event isn't just a continuation of the cinema going tradition of Torquay, but we also a continuation of the tradition of gathering to hear stories in the caves that will have gone back to the earliest human ancestors who inhabited the caves tens of thousands of years ago.

What is the importance of telling these stories and how do they impact the future culture of the area?

It's important to capture the stories around social spaces like the cinema, not just to preserve them, but to make people appreciate their importance as centres of the community. Hopefully if more attention is paid to the value of these spaces then more can be done to ensure that this type of community meeting place isn't lost. It's also important to capture day to day recollections to make people realise that their own stories and memories have value, and we should share them.

Come As You Are - A Q+A With Fragment



Come As You Are, our one-day festival exploring gender identity and celebrating the trans, non-binary and gender diverse communities of the South West, returns in November. This year our programme hosts a range of interactive activities and drop-in crafts, informative talks and discussions, music and art, and much more! Ahead of the festival we spoke to artist Maple Bloom (AKA Fragment) about the creative practice of stickerbombing.

What is stickerbombing and how did you get inspired to start making some yourself?

Stickerbombing is the practice of putting a large amount of stickers into a collage - think like how people decorate their laptop lids, skateboard decks, journals... if you've done something like that before, congrats, you've made a stickerbomb! I've always grown up with an appreciation for street art and during a trip to London and Camden Market with a friend a few years back, I had my eyes opened as to the power of what stickers could do, seeing artwork, name tags and rallying cries on any surface they could be stuck to. So, on my way

back home, I got some cheap office labels from WHSmith and started brainstorming. Over time I've made hundreds of stickers and collected hundreds more from local and worldwide artists for spreading and sharing across the cities I roam, like little artwork installations.

What do you enjoy most about the South West/Exeter creative community?

Tight knit togetherness and collaborativeness. As I've gotten to know more of the community in the city and seen more sticker artists spring up we've all found ourselves regularly getting together, throwing around ideas, having drawing sessions... We've all found ourselves really inspired by each other and I think that shows a lot when you see everyone's stickers around Exeter's streets, with friends' art being right next to each other, people having conversations with strangers through stickers, it's a very friendly and encouraging environment to be in.



What advice would you give to other creatives who want to start their own practice?

Get started as soon as you can, but don't rush into it. Let yourself take the time to develop your craft, and have patience with yourself potentially being bad at things - I don't know anyone who was naturally talented at what it is they do without putting a lot of work over the years. Yes, you're going to suck at doing something new, even if you have some experience with other crafts, and yes, looking at other artist's work compared to your own can feel demoralising. Don't let it stop you. Embrace it, use it as a chance to experiment, let yourself truly have fun with the process and over time, you can learn methods for yourself that make things easier, pick up tricks that make your art look better, and in two to three years time, you'll be able to look at the art you do now, and then look at the art you did when you started, and say to yourself...
"WOW, I SUCKED back then". Which is always a sign everything's getting better.

Alice Clough

Artist's Moving Image Commission Update

Alice Clough is a research-led artist with a background in archaeology and anthropology. Her work interrogates cultural storytelling, asking questions like: which stories shape our lives? How do stories reside in objects and materials? Which stories take on a life of their own? Alice is making a film that explores the space between fact and fiction. Inspired by ancient myths and using traditional folk tales as a starting point, she will focus on horse-human relationships to ask what the nonhuman can teach us about kinship and care.

Alice has been busy collecting footage for her Artist's Moving Image commission 'I would crawl into a horse's left ear' and has shared some behind the scenes photos and updates with us!

How does your AMI commission relate to your practice?

For the last couple of years I have been making work about horses, initially inspired by living near Dartmoor and later by moving to a home where horses also live. This theme is continuing in my Artist Moving Image commission, which explores attention, closeness and relationships between humans and animals.

I'm using the commission as an opportunity to really deepen and expand my creative practice. Throughout the process I have been working with incredible mentors exploring filmmaking, writing, 16mm filming and processing, and sound design. Together, these skills are helping me develop a kind of expanded sculptural practice which feels very new and exciting to me.

What have you been up to so far?

At the time of writing this I'm busy editing the various pieces of footage, text, and field recording into something that feels whole. Whereas many filmmakers might do detailed planning and storyboarding before they start filming, the fact that I've been working with horses has led to a more documentary style, where I am responding to what is happening in front of me and following my intuition. This approach has continued into the editing process, where I find myself having to make bold decisions about what to include or exclude.

What have you enjoyed most about the process?

This commission has been such an enjoyable process, and a massive learning curve! It's been a series of firsts for me, from the first time using professional cameras and lenses to the first time collaborating and seeking support from other creative professionals. I think one of the loveliest things about it has been having a reason to spend long periods of time in the company of horses, and I also feel really excited by the sort of patchwork process of experimentation in the edit - seeing how image affects sound, words affect image, etc.

If I had to sum it up I'd say the commission is an incredible way to grow and evolve as an artist, especially if you are new to the world of moving image. I'm so grateful for the opportunity, and to the horses and humans who have been so generous along the way:)

Biophilia



In November South West Dance Hub are curating Biophilia, a trio of magical performances by Devon based artists from the collectives Swift Dance Co, Noon, and Chhya Youth. We chatted to Ruth Bell, member of SWDH and Swift Dance Co, about the inspiration behind the themes and curation of the event and the importance of collaboration and creative collectives.

How has the natural world informed or inspired your performance?

The initial inspiration for Glimpses of Wonder came from the collections of sea creatures within RAMM. I became interested in this human need to place specimens behind glass and dissociate ourselves from the natural world. My question is how do we view our place within nature and how can we reconnect to our animal selves and the natural world? My work is often inspired by landscape, nature and what it means to be human. The costumes for this project are inspired by the glass sculptures of Steffan Damm, RAMM.

What do you enjoy most about being part of a collective/group?

Being part of the Swift Dance Company and South West Dance Hub offers me space to explore ideas, take risks and develop new work. I love the mix of artists we work with and the support being part of a collective offers. I feel very lucky to be part of this creative mixing pot.



What advice would you give to people wanting to get involved in the South West dance/performance scene?

Come to the South West Dance Hub, at the Exeter Phoenix on Tuesdays. We are a very welcoming space, encouraging collaboration and offering professionally facilitated sessions in an experimental and supportive atmosphere. We welcome dancers and makers who wish to deepen their practice and connect with others. We also encourage artists from other disciplines who wish to explore collaboration with dance.
